The Titanic, transporting famous wealthy people such as John Jacob, Margaret Brown, Benjamin Guggenheim, Captain Edward John Smith, Isidor and Ida Straus, Thomas Andrews, Lady Duff Gordan, Lady Countess Rothes and Millvina Dean, left April 2, 1912. It departed with a huge celebration of the maiden voyage of the "Unsinkable Ship" and the "Wonder Ship." At 2:20 am on April 15, the Titanic hit an iceberg, and sank. When they hit the iceberg they were in the northern part of the Atlantic Ocean. There were

about 2,240 passengers and crew on board.

According to the U.S. committee investigating the sinking, 1,517 lives were



lost, including 700 of the crewmembers.

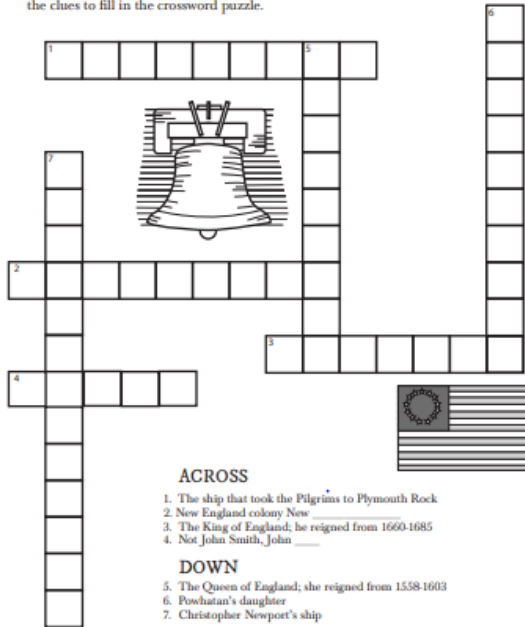
national, not a state park. It got its national park status from President Ulysses Grant, who wanted to create a beautiful wildlife

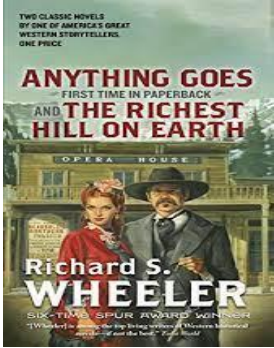


THE RICHEST HILL ON EARTH

immigrants from much of the rest of the world. Miners from all over the world. Miners came to Butte during the early 1800s through 1900s during the boom. Your reporter Michael S.

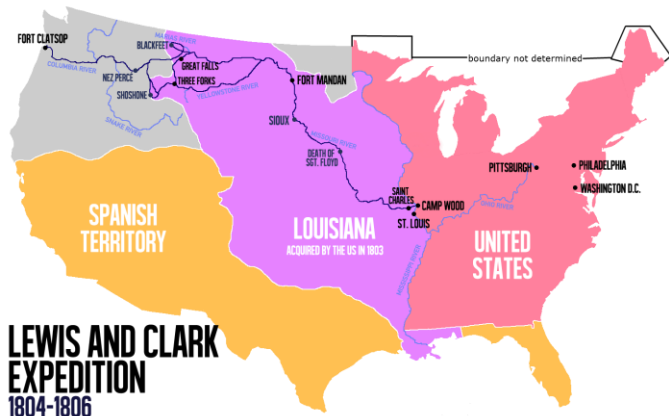
Yellowstone National Park History
