1. Snappy Beginning

- Attention Getter
- State topic and purpose

2. Meaty Middle

- Topic well-stated (obviously persuasive)
- at least 2 arguments/solutions that reinforce

3. Powerful Ending

- Restate the topic and its importance to audience
- Provide a personal opinion
- Eye contact
- Vocal expression
- Time (4-6 min.)

Grade 5: Oratory

Purpose: to motivate, convince, inspire, or persuade the audience



___ 1. No costumes or implied by clothing (example: shirt with related logo or topic)

___ 2. 4-6 minutes in length

___ 3. notecards may be used (as a reference), but majority should be memorized

___ 4. quotations must be cited (tell where quote came from: "according to...")

___ 5. can paraphrase quotations (put them in own words and explain)

___ 6. typed copy may be requested
